Hopefully, by the time you are reading this letter, the warmer weather is here!

Since the beginning of the year, we have hit the ground running. Playing a little catch-up, we have a lot of tasks to complete. To help me do the job of Supervisor correctly, I have attended a 3 day seminar for newly elected officials. I and Deputy Supervisor Sue Fuller attend and plan on continuing to attend monthly GAM (Genesee Association of Municipalities) meetings. There is a wealth of information that comes out of these meetings.

As of the writing of this letter, we have scheduled information meetings on March 5th and 6th for four proposed water districts. Hopefully, after these meetings, everyone will have a better idea of what needs to happen in order for this to become a reality. I would urge anyone who has questions regarding public water to please stop in to the Town Hall and speak to myself or Barry Flansburg, the Town Assessor. Barry is extremely knowledgeable about this subject as he has been involved with other water districts in Genesee and Orleans counties.

We also will be working on revisions to the current sewer ordinance to ensure NO sump pumps or roof drains are directed into the Town's municipal sewer. This will help to sustain the system just that much longer. As with all of us, they are not getting any younger!

Finally, I thank you for the opportunity to be your Town Supervisor, and I encourage everyone to please attend our monthly meetings. The meetings are held the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Knowledge is power, and this is our Town.

Genesee County Legislator, Robert Bausch

One of the most important responsibilities for any elected official is to communicate with their constituents about issues of concern. With that in mind, I would like to thank the Byron Town Clerk, Debra Buck-Leaton, for providing space in the town newsletter to assist me in meeting this responsibility. If you ever have any questions about issues discussed in these letters, or any county activity, please contact me.

Over the past two months the county legislature has been busy adjusting to many organizational changes. The most significant was the election of a new chair upon Mary Pat Hancock's retirement after 22 years with 13 years as chair. At the organization meeting, the legislature elected Ray Cianfrini, Legislator District 1 (Towns of Alabama & Oakfield) as the new Chair. With this change and the election of two new legislators, various legislative assignments were also changed. Annie Lawrence, Legislator District 3 (Towns of Darien & Pembroke) was appointed Chair of the Human Services Committee and Marianne Clattenburg, Legislator District 8 (north side of the City of Batavia) was appointed Chair of the Public Services Committee.

I remained Chair of the Ways and Means Committee and a member of the Public Services Committee, but a number of my special assignments were changed. I was appointed to the Criminal Justice Board, Genesee Finger Lakes Regional Planning Council, Inter County Advisory Group, and the Rochester Transportation Council while remaining on the Water Resource Agency Board and continuing as liaison to the Chamber of Commerce.

The legislature started the year where the old legislature left off: addressing the finances of the Genesee County Nursing Home. Three legislative subcommittees were appointed to address related issues. The first, which I am a member of, is developing alternative financial models. The second is reviewing current operations to identify additional cost saving options. The third is working with the community at large to ensure county residents understand the issues and have an opportunity to provide input. The legislature's goal is to develop a plan for the long term viability of the nursing home by this summer.

There are numerous departments of county government and often the smaller departments are overlooked. The History Department is a good example. The department has the responsibility for county record retention and serves as the repository for various county historical records such as newspapers and military records. Sue Conklin is the supervisor and an excellent historian with a willingness to assist visitors. Last fall the department moved to newly renovated space in County Building 2, on West Main St. Rd. The entrance is on the east side just past the Veterans Service entrance. The area is very spacious and bright and the materials are well organized. If you are interested in researching local or family history, please avail yourself of this excellent county resource.

Byron Heritage Festival

The Byron Heritage Festival Committee has already begun work on the 2014 Festival, which will take place on Saturday, July 26th. We have decided that we are going to bring the Festival back to a full day event. Clients must be at least 18 years of age to pick up food from the site. Financial statements of any kind are NOT required, though we will have a sign in sheet. Please be prepared to provide details about the size/age group of your family. Bring a bag with you if you like! Volunteers will be available to help carry food items to your vehicle.

BACKPACK PROGRAM The Byron Presbyterian Church has been hosting this program for the past few years for food insecure students at Byron-Bergen Central School. Each week of the school year, students participating in the program take home a bag of nutritious food items for the weekend. This program has helped close the budget gap for area families and made a difference in the lives of the children. We have had past support from churches, civic organizations, stores and individuals within our community. Last year, we had a grant through Foodlink that helped to supplement this program. This year we have secured funding from the Genesee County United Way and we are very grateful for that funding. In fact, if you participate in United Way by directing monies from your pay, you can indicate you would like your donations to go to Genesee County UW Backpack Program, Code 90221. We have been using the monies received from GCUW and other donations to order bulk food from Foodlink, delivered right to the school. The school generously provided space for storage and packing right at the school this year. Faline Tyler has been instrumental in the high school building, helping to make sure the kids receive the food items and we have had support from the school maintenance department in transporting full and empty bags back and forth to the elementary building. Thank you to all who have previously supported this wonderful initiative, allowing us to reach out to our local school children and provide a helping hand.

From the Historian's Desk

Save the date...May 22 will be the spring meeting of the Byron Historical Society at the Byron Presbyterian Church. I believe dinner is at 6:00 p.m. with a program of local history to follow.

From my file on the early history of Byron, I have a few things that I will give you and you are welcome to read the file yourself, which is stored at the museum. Byron was formed from Bergen on April 4, 1820 (our 200th birthday will be in 2020), and named in honor of Lord Byron. Prior to 1820 there were approximately 52 male settlers, the first being Samuel and Sherrard Parker in 1806.

North Byron, also known as Pumpkin Hill, got its nickname from the tavern sign, at that place, in the shape and color to resemble a pumpkin.

South Byron was known as Brusselville, was named from the fact that an early settler had a "brussel head."

I came across a reference to Sodom being a place in Byron, which I found interesting. The old Walker family cemetery on Batavia-Byron Rd. is referred to as Sodom Cemetery, and I was told it got its name from the two cities of sin that God destroyed in the Bible, Gomorra was suppose to have been a whiskey still not far from the cemetery. Sodom as a place appears to be the corner of Batavia-Byron Road and Cockram Road.

South Byron Fire Department

Good day everyone,

I have been asked to submit an article on behalf of the South Byron Volunteer Fire Co.

First, I would like to thank the town highway department and the many community members on the great job of clearing a path to the many fire hydrants throughout our town. This has been proven to be a great time saver when needed.

Let's get down to business. In 2013 we were audited by the New York State Comptroller's Office. Through the many hours and countless pages of paperwork, the Fire Co. was found to be lacking in only one area. The item in question was that the department did not have a written policy regarding the use of the Fire Co. issued credit cards. As of 1/13/2014 a policy has been written, approved and implemented. This allows us to be 100% in compliance with the rules and regulations set forth by New York.

The Center for Governmental Research project which involves the town and both Fire Depts. has been moving forward. On behalf of the South Byron Fire Co., we have provided all the necessary documents and have answered any and all questions in a timely manner. We look forward to working with all entities involved with this project.

There has been discussion in town about the Mercy EMS ambulance staged in our hall. The management team at Mercy EMS contacted us about the possibility of staging an ambulance in our truck hall. The reason for the request is twofold. For one, this will improve response times to this end of the county (being east of route 98) with Mercy staging another rig to the west of route 98 (also in a fire hall) for the same purpose. The other reason is that it gives the crew a warm facility to take breaks and allows them to turn off the ambulance when not in use. This saves time, fuel costs and reduces maintenance. We look forward to working with Mercy EMS and their crews for many years to come. Ultimately, saving time saves lives.

In the month of March we will be turning the clocks ahead. This is a great opportunity to review with your family members about the use of smoke detectors, CO2 detectors, and fire extinguishers. Take the time to change out the batteries with fresh ones and to check the charge on your fire extinguisher. Also take a moment to look for and read the expiration dates. Over time these devices become less effective and eventually will need to be replaced.

Let's talk about finances. Every year, the Fire Co. receives support through donations, hall rental, sportsman's raffle, and the fire tax. This funding allows us to not only pay the bills such as, utilities, insurance, truck payments, and facility upkeep. This funding also allows us to improve our firefighting capabilities. This year we anticipate replacing our turnout gear, which is worn by firefighters to every call. The approximate cost of one set of gear is \$2,500 to \$3,000. We are in the process of receiving bids and plan on making a decision in the months to come.

Another item that will need to be replaced in the next 3 to 4 years is our first due engine, 86. Why so far in advance you ask? It takes approximately 2 to 3 years of meetings, planning visits, and truck specification reviews to make sure we are receiving the best value for our dollar. Our tanker, 87, was slightly more than \$250,000 five years ago, and we are estimating the cost of a replacement for 86 will be in the \$350,000 to \$400,000 range. We have a reserve fund designated for truck replacement which was established to help offset

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costs. We replace our trucks every 20 years, and engine 86 has served us well. Since we received it in 1997, firefighting technology has changed and for the safety of our community, we must change with it. The next truck will be updated with all the latest technology and will serve us well for the next 20 years.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the members of our Fire Co. and their families on the countless hours of hard work and dedication helping to make this Fire Co. the best it possibly can be.
